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Monthly Review of the Texas Economy—October 2019

The Texas economy gained 300,000 nonagricultural jobs from September 2018 to September 2019, an annual growth rate of 2.4 percent, higher than the nation's employment growth rate of 1.4 percent (Table 1 and Figure 1). The nongovernment sector added 290,500 jobs, an annual growth rate of 2.7 percent, also more than the nation's employment growth rate of 1.6 percent in the private sector (Table 1).

Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in September 2019 was 3.4 percent, lower than the 3.7 percent rate in September 2018. The nation's rate decreased from 3.7 to 3.5 percent (Table 1).

Texas Employment Growth Rates by Industry

Table 2 shows Texas industries ranked by employment growth rate from September 2018 to September 2019. All Texas industries except the information industry had more jobs in September 2019 than in September 2018. The construction industry ranked first in job creation followed by leisure and hospitality; other services; financial activities; manufacturing; education and health services; and transportation, warehousing, and utilities. Figures 2 to 13 show trends in employment growth rates by industry.

Texas Job Shares by Industry and the Government Sector

Table 3 shows Texas industries and the state's government sector ranked by their shares of Texas jobs in September 2019. Of the 12,860,000 nonagricultural jobs in September 2019, the highest percentage of employment by industry was in the government sector followed by trade, professional and business services, education and health services, leisure and hospitality, and manufacturing. Since September 2018, education and health services; leisure and hospitality; manufacturing; financial activities; construction; transportation, warehousing, and utilities; and other services have expanded their shares of Texas employment at the expense of the government sector, trade, professional and business services, mining and logging, and the information industry. Figures 14 to 25 show trends in shares of total Texas jobs by industry.

Contributions to Texas Employment Growth Rate by Industry

Texas' statewide employment growth rate of 2.4 percent, or more exactly 2.3885 percent, from September 2018 to September 2019 is the weighted average of employment growth rates for all Texas industries for the period. Weights are shares of jobs by industry. The contribution of each industry to the statewide employment growth rate is equal to the employment growth rate of that industry multiplied by its share of Texas jobs. Table 4 shows Texas industries and the state's government sector ranked by their contributions to Texas employment growth rates from September 2018 to September 2019. Leisure and hospitality ranked first in contribution to job growth followed by construction, education and health services, professional and business services, financial activities, and manufacturing. Figures 26 to 37 show trends in contributions of Texas industries to Texas job growth rates.

Employment Growth Rates by Texas Metropolitan Areas

All Texas metro areas except Wichita Falls, Longview, and Victoria had more jobs in September 2019 than in September 2018 (Table 5). Dallas-Plano-Irving ranked first in job creation followed by San Antonio-New Braunfels, McAllen-Edinburg-Mission, Houston-The Woodlands-Sugar Land, and Killeen-Temple-Fort Hood. Figures 38 to 63 show trends in annual employment growth rates for the state's metropolitan areas.



Texas Job Shares by Metropolitan Area

Table 6 shows Texas metropolitan areas ranked by their shares of total Texas jobs in September 2019. Houston-The Woodlands-Sugar Land had the largest share of Texas jobs followed by Dallas-Plano-Irving, Austin-Round Rock, San Antonio-New Braunfels, Fort Worth-Arlington, El Paso, and McAllen-Edinburg-Mission. Figures 64 to 89 show trends in metropolitan shares of total Texas jobs.

Contributions to Texas' Employment Growth Rate by Metropolitan Area

The statewide employment growth rate of 2.3885 percent in Texas from September 2018 to September 2019 is the weighted average of employment growth rates of all Texas metros for the period. Weights are shares of jobs by area. The contribution of each metro to the statewide employment growth rate is equal to the employment growth rate in that area multiplied by its share of Texas jobs. Table 7 shows Texas metros ranked by their contributions to Texas employment growth rates from September 2018 to September 2019. Dallas-Plano-Irving ranked first followed by Houston-The Woodlands-Sugar Land, San Antonio-New Braunfels, Fort Worth-Arlington, Austin-Round Rock, McAllen-Edinburg-Mission, and Killeen-Temple-Fort Hood. Figures 90 to 115 show trends in contributions of Texas metros to total Texas job growth rates.

Unemployment Rate by Metropolitan Area

The state's actual unemployment rate in September 2019 was 3.3 percent. Midland had the lowest unemployment rate followed by Amarillo, Austin-Round Rock, College Station-Bryan, Odessa, and Lubbock, and San Angelo (Table 8).

Employment Growth Rates by Industry in Largest Texas Metropolitan Areas

Table 9 shows annual growth rates of employment by industry in the six largest Texas metropolitan areas from September 2018 to September 2019. Houston-The Woodlands-Sugar Land and Dallas-Plano-Irving are currently experiencing positive employment growth rates in the government sector and in all industries except information. San Antonio-New Braunfels is currently experiencing employment growth in the area's government sector and in all industries except manufacturing. Fort Worth-Arlington's economy is currently driven by financial activities; manufacturing; education and health services; leisure and hospitality; and trade, transportation, and utilities. Austin is currently experiencing positive employment growth rates in the government sector and in all industries except education and health services. El Paso's economy is currently experiencing positive employment growth rates in the government sector and in all industries except manufacturing; trade, transportation, and utilities; information; and professional and business services.

Nonfarm Employment Growth Rates for United States and Texas







Annual Employment Growth Rates, 2016-2019



Share of Total Texas Jobs 2016-2019



Texas Education and Health Services Industry



Texas Leisure and Hospitality Industry






Figure 19 Texas Manufacturing Industry Share of Total Texas Jobs,2016-2019




Figure 20 Texas Financial Activities Industry




Figure 21 **Texas Construction Industry**




Figure 22 Texas Transportation, Utilities, Warehousing Industry







Figure 27 **Texas Construction Industry**







Texas Financial Activities Industry



Texas Manufacturing Industry






San Antonio-New Braunfels Metro Area



Figure 42 Killeen-Temple Metro Area






Figure 43 Laredo Metro Area






Figure 51 Texarkana Metro Area Annual Employment Growth Rates, 2016-2019 3 2 Percent -1 Year:Month -2 2016 2018 2019 2017 Sources: Texas Workforce Commission and Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University






Figure 58 Amarillo Metro Area




Figure 59 e-Harlingen Metro Are









Fort Worth-Arlington Metro Area




Figure 69 El Paso Metro Area

Share of Total Teyas Jobs 2016-2019




Figure 71 Corpus Christi Metro Area




Figure 72 Beaumont-Port Arthur Metro Area




Figure 74 Killeen-Temple Metro Area






Figure 78 Amarillo Metro Area






Figure 79 Midland Metro Area




Figure 81 Laredo Metro Area






Figure 84 Abilene Metro Area






Figure 85 Texarkana Metro Area




Figure 86 Wichita Falls Metro Area





Sherman-Denison Metro Area




Figure 89 Victoria Metro Area

Dallas-Plano-Irving Metro Area





Figure 91 Houston-The Woodlands-Sugar Land Metro Area

Figure 92 San Antonio-New Braunfels Metro Area




Figure 93 Fort Worth-Arlington Metro Area




Figure 94 Austin-Round Rock Metro Area




Figure 100 Laredo Metro Area




Figure 102 College Station-Bryan Metro Area




Figure 103 Tyler Metro Area




Figure 107 Midland Metro Area




Figure 108 Amarillo Metro Area



San Angelo Metro Area




